11. Discuss how Ezekiel's "Goodbye Party For Miss Pushpa T.S." uses the speaker's flawed language to create a satirical effect.
12. How does "The Road Not Taken" reflect the speaker's journey and contemplation?
13. Discuss how "Bora Ring" connects personal memory with a collective, historical past.
14. How does "Words" explore the relationship between the poet and their work?
